
As a Forest Grove resident myself, policing in this City is something I take to heart. Our team at FGPD is committed to our core values of Service, Integrity, and Professionalism.







DEPARTMENT OVERVIEW:


The Forest Grove Police Department serves the community of Forest Grove through law enforcement patrol, investigative services, crime prevention, and community outreach. At the end of 2018, the department employed 29 sworn officers, including a chief, two captains (division commanders), four sergeants (including one detective sergeant), two detectives, and 20 patrol officers (including one school resource officer). The department also employed a full-time code enforcement officer and a part-time community outreach specialist, a support unit supervisor, an evidence specialist, and two records specialists. A volunteer chaplain also served the members of the department and community.



AGE OF SWORN PERSONNEL




OFFICERS BY AGE BRACKET

YEARS WITH FGPD





ADMINISTRATION:

The department administration is comprised of the Chief of Police, Operations Division Commander, Administrative Division Commander, and Support Unit Supervisor. The administration is responsible for budget management, policy development and review, personnel matters, strategic planning, community relations, media relations, labor relations, and special projects. The department administration oversees department training.

FROM TOP TO BOTTOM:

CHIEF JANIE SCHUTZ: Joined the Forest Grove Police Department in 2012 and has more than 30 years of law enforcement experience with agencies in Wisconsin, Michigan, North Carolina and Oregon. Chief Schutz holds BA degrees in Criminal Justice and Political Science, and has served as a patrol officer, patrol sergeant, detective, detective sergeant, and academy instructor, as well as serving as the Chief of Police in Wadesboro, North Carolina prior to joining the FGPD.

CAPTAIN KEVIN ELLINGSBURG: Joined the Forest Grove Police in 1993 and has served in law enforcement for more than 25 years. Captain Ellingsburg is a veteran of the U.S. Army, and holds a BS in Administration of Justice from Portland State University. He has served as a patrol officer, patrol sergeant, detective, firearms instructor, range master, and motor officer. He was promoted to the rank of Captain in 2013, and serves as the Administrative Division Commander.

CAPTAIN MICHAEL HALL: Joined the Forest Grove Police in 1996. A veteran of the U.S. Army, Captain Hall has worked in law enforcement for more than 22 years. He holds a BS in Administration of Justice from Portland State University. In his tenure, he has served as a patrol officer, patrol sergeant, detective, detective sergeant, and administrative sergeant, as well as on the Major Crimes and Crash Reconstruction and Analysis teams. He was promoted to the rank of Captain in April 2018, and serves as the Operations Division Commander.

SUPPORT UNIT SUPERVISOR LISA CANNON: Joined the Forest Grove Police Department in 2011. Lisa oversees the Records department and the Community Outreach Specialist, as well as purchasing, payroll, payables, and the records management system. She holds a BA in Business Management with a psychology minor, and previously worked for a hotel/restaurant management company for 16 years, 12 of which as the Human Resources Manager. Lisa is one of six non-sworn, civilian employees at the FGPD.



SERGEANTS:

The Forest Grove Police Department has three patrol sergeants who oversee patrol officers for day, swing, and night shifts, and one detective sergeant who oversees the investigative team.

FROM TOP TO BOTTOM:

SERGEANT MATTHEW SMITH: Joined the Forest Grove Police Department in 2003 and has more than 18 years of law enforcement experience, starting in high school as a Beaverton Police cadet and reserve officer. Sgt. Smith holds a BS in History and an Executive Masters in Public Administration. He has served as a patrol officer, detective, detective sergeant, and patrol sergeant. Additionally, Sgt. Smith has served as a crash reconstructionist, a member of Washington County Major Crimes Team, and Washington County's Child Abuse and Elder Abuse Multidisciplinary teams. Sgt. Smith will assume the position of Administrative Division Commander in the third quarter of 2019.

SERGEANT SCOTT KING: Joined the Forest Grove Police Department in 2005 and has more than 16 years of law enforcement experience, starting as a Beaverton Police cadet in high school and later a reserve officer. Sgt. King holds a BA in Sociology from Pacific University and has served as a patrol officer, field training officer, detective, and patrol sergeant. He also oversees the department's field training evaluation program and the reserve program.

DETECTIVE SERGEANT TROY MASLEN: Joined the Forest Grove Police Department in 1994 and has more than 26 years of law enforcement experience. He has served as a reserve officer, patrol officer, patrol sergeant, detective, transit officer, and motor officer. He holds a BS in Criminal Justice. In addition to supervising the Detective Unit, Sgt. Maslen also oversees Evidence, the School Resource Officer and the Code Enforcement Officer.

SERGEANT JEREMY LAZENBY: Joined the Forest Grove Police Department in 2012 and has more than 8 years of law enforcement experience. A veteran of the United States Marine Corps, Sgt. Lazenby served as a Washington County Sheriff's Deputy prior to joining the FGPD. He has served as a reserve officer, patrol officer, detective, and patrol sergeant.



DETECTIVES:

The Forest Grove Police Department has an Investigations division that currently comprises two detectives and a detective sergeant. To serve in Investigations, officers are expected to have at least five years of patrol experience and participated in trainings in a variety of law enforcement disciplines.

Detectives also assist the Patrol Division by covering shifts when staffing shortages arise, as well as completing search warrants and affidavits when necessary.



POLICE OFFICER OATH:

I do solemnly swear that I will support the Constitution of the United States, the Constitution of the State of Oregon, the laws and ordinances of the City of Forest Grove, and the rules and regulations of the Forest Grove Police Department. I will faithfully discharge the duties of the office of Police Officer for the Forest Grove Police Department, to which I have been appointed according to law.





PATROL DIVISION:

The Forest Grove Police Department's patrol division is broken into three shifts: day, swing, and night. Each shift is comprised of up to six patrol officers and is supervised by a patrol sergeant who also responds to calls. Patrol officers respond to calls, conduct proactive patrol throughout the city, and enforce traffic regulations, city ordinances, and state statutes. The Patrol Division also supplies a school resource officer to the Forest Grove School District (see page 22).

On average, the FGPD receives 50-70 calls for service each day, and will be involved in an average of 400-500 activities each week, both reported and self-initiated. In most cases, patrol personnel investigate both the initial report of crimes and conduct all related follow-up and ensure criminal cases are ready for prosecution when appropriate.

In 2018, the Forest Grove Police Department responded to 23,479 calls. This included 10,462 dispatched calls - calls in which members of the public contact dispatch through non-emergency or 911 requesting service. Officers also engaged in 13,017 self-initiated calls - incidents in which officers initiate the call, such as a traffic stop or a suspicious circumstance.

Sergeants and officers averaged 1,067 calls each in 2018 and wrote, on average, 239 reports each. Common dispatched calls for service in 2018 were regarding suspicious circumstances, including suspicious persons and vehicles. Police also responded to a variety of calls for public assistance, including welfare checks, premise checks and extra patrols.


In 2018, the top five incidents officers responded to were thefts, domestic disturbances, fraud, burglaries, and assaults. Police made 934 arrests in 2018, and issued 1,821 citations.



TOTAL CALLS FOR SERVICE BY YEAR




TOP FIVE SPECIFIC INCIDENT TYPES BY YEAR





BEYOND INCIDENT RESPONSE:

Patrol officers are routinely engaged in trainings that build knowledge and skills, and will usually specialize in any number of specialty fields within law enforcement. Seasoned officers also take on the role of training new officers as they leave the police academy and begin their service with the FGPD.

Some personnel from the operations division are members of countywide teams, including Major Crimes, Multi-Disciplinary Child Abuse, Emergency Behavioral Health, Elder Abuse, Drug Recognition Expert program and Crash Analysis Reconstruction Team (CART). Patrol personnel also liaison with various social service agencies to address other societal issues such as mental health problems, elder abuse, and juvenile delinquency.


In addition to criminal investigations, patrol personnel participated in special projects and events such as, Shop With a Cop, Forest Grove Light Parade, enhanced DUII enforcement, underage alcohol purchase operations, Pacific University and Forest Grove High School events, Reserve Officer training and selection, various marathons and community events and the department's National Night Out celebration.






TRAFFIC ENFORCEMENT STATS


TOTAL TRAFFIC STOPS BY YEAR (2014-2018)




TRAFFIC CRASHES BY YEAR

INVESTIGATIONS

The Detective Division of the Forest Grove Police Department is dedicated to providing the highest quality of service to the citizens of Forest Grove and is committed to innovating whenever possible. This commitment is exemplified by service not only to our interagency partners, but to our drive to deliver justice to the victims in the criminal cases that we are honored to serve.

Detectives typically investigate complex cases that require follow-up in other geographical areas or cases that are complex and require long term time commitment. Detectives are considered general assignment but typically investigate child abuse, adult sexual assaults, violent assaults and homicides. Additionally, detectives currently interact with the County Multi-Disciplinary Teams (MDT) for Child and Elder Abuse, and the Major Crimes Team (MCT).

In 2018, Forest Grove Detectives investigated a wide variety of cases while enduring an unfilled detective position. A total of 47 cases were assigned to the Detectives Division during 2018. 17 original reports were completed as well as 258 follow up reports and 12 search warrants. The Unit closed 44 cases and completed 12 background investigations. Detectives also assisted with two Washington County details, which were Registered Sex Offender Compliance Checks (106 home visits) and a Human Trafficking Sting that resulted in 8 arrests.

Additionally, the Investigative Division was extremely busy with a Homicide investigation that occurred on March 19, 2018, which was worked with the assistance of the Major Crimes Team.

Forest Grove Detectives also assisted the patrol division in 2018 by covering shifts when staffing shortages arose, completing Search Warrant affidavits and Search Warrants when the need arose, and also in completing remedial and in-service training for patrol personnel.

MAJOR CASES 2018:

(Pictured Top to Bottom)

FEBRUARY 2018:

On February 14th, 2018, the Walt Disney Corporation contacted the FGPD regarding possible fraudulent activity from a family in Forest Grove. The family had purchased more than \$40,000 worth of merchandise via several different transactions, including several from fraudulent credit cards. Forest Grove Detectives executed a search warrant at the family's residence and recovered a majority of the stolen property, including toys, clothing, décor, memorabilia, DVDs and more. Ashley Trapp, the mother of the household, was arrested and pled guilty on her charges.



MARCH 2018:

On March 14th, 2018, Garrett Pruitt-Rexroad rented a room at McMenamins using a fictitious name and cloned credit card. When the hotel clerk grew suspicious, Pruitt-Rexroad left the location in a stolen rental van and initially attempted to elude officers but was unsuccessful. He was taken into custody and a search warrant was executed for his hotel room and van. Detectives located more than 40 cloned credit cards and IDs, along with sophisticated card readers and computer equipment. During the investigation, it was learned Pruitt-Rexroad was also suspected of criminal activity in seven different counties. This case is pending trial.



MARCH 2018

On March 19th, 2018, officers conducted a welfare check on an apartment where a 53 year old female, Cynthia Belton (pictured right), had not been seen or heard from in several days. Patrol located Belton deceased in her home; the medical examiner responded and ruled it a death under suspicious circumstances. Detectives and the Washington County Major Crimes Team, in conjunction with the Oregon State Police Forensics Unit, conducted a murder investigation. During the investigation, Kamen Baer and Andrea Tijerina were identified as persons of interest. Several search warrants were executed and interviews conducted with both suspects. Kamen Baer was eventually arrested.



SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICER

Officer Clarice Gordon has served as the Forest Grove School Resource Officer since 2016.



The Forest Grove police department supplies one School Resource Officer (SRO) to the Forest Grove School District. The SRO is a patrol officer with sworn authority specifically assigned to work in collaboration with school and community-based organizations. The SRO typically serves a four-year assignment.

In 2018, the SRO responded to more than 500 calls for service. The most common incidents are theft, assault, drug possession, and sexual assault, in addition to a slough of incidents involving bullying, harassment, and social media.

CODE ENFORCEMENT OFFICER

Code Enforcement Officer Joseph McCullough joined the Forest Grove Police Department in August, 2018.

The City of Forest Grove establishes rules and regulations regarding property, noise, parking, and vehicles, among others, in order to keep Forest Grove a safe and pleasant community to live, work, and enjoy.

When a property or vehicle violates the City's Ordinances, the Forest Grove Police Department's Code Enforcement Officer assists in resolving the issue by working with property or vehicle owners to find solutions. The Code Enforcement Officer is a non-sworn civilian and is specifically dedicated to handling only code calls.

Since joining the FGPD in August 2018, Code Enforcement Officer McCullough took 311 calls for service. Overall, Forest Grove Police responded to more than 1360 code enforcement related calls in 2018.

Examples of Code Enforcement calls:

- Parking complaints and abandoned vehicles
- Property complaints, including junk, hazards and vegetation
- Ordinance violations, including extended RV stays
- Illegal dumping and littering
- Criminal Mischief, including graffiti

SUPPORT UNIT

RECORDS. EVIDENCE. OUTREACH.

The FGPD currently employs a support unit of non-sworn employees who assist officers and the public in the day to day operations of the department. This includes assisting officers from processing and tracking reports and evidence, assisting citizens who come through the FGPD lobby or call the main office.

Records:

- ◆ Records Specialists ensure that data from citations and reports is entered into any number of state and local databases. They route documents to the appropriate entities such as Department of Human Services, District Attorney, and other law enforcement jurisdictions. Records Specialists ensure compliance with public records laws and reporting requirements, and maintain and purge records according to state laws and city policies. They also process any records requests from members of the public.
- ◆ Records staff also assist citizens who come into the police department lobby or contact the main business line.

Evidence

- ◆ The Evidence Specialist is responsible for logging and storing evidence that is seized by officers, tracking all evidence from the time of seizure to the end of its usefulness. At that point, the Evidence Specialist is responsible for the retention and/or destruction of that evidence.
- ◆ The Evidence Specialist partners with the United States Drug Enforcement Agency in sponsoring National Prescription Drug Take Back events twice a year, and is responsible for maintaining a prescription drop-box for public use in the FGPD lobby.

Community Outreach

- ◆ The Community Outreach Specialist (COS) is responsible for the department's many educational and crime prevention programs, such as Citizen's Academy, Neighborhood Watch, Scam Workshops, Coffee with a Cop, National Night Out, in addition to community events throughout the year.
- ◆ The COS manages the FGPD's web content, social media accounts, department publications and educational resources.

OREGON PEACE OFFICER'S ASSOCIATION (OPOA) AWARDS:

MENTAL HEALTH & CRISIS INTERVENTION TRAINING (CIT)

- ◆ In 2018, nine Forest Grove Police officers successfully completed Washington County's Crisis Intervention Training (CIT) course, a program developed in 2017 to equip officers to better respond to mental and behavioral health calls. CIT trainings are held three times per year and include 40 hours of instruction and scenario-based training.
- ◆ In April 2018, Detective Darren Pomeroy (pictured bottom right) was invited by the Washington County CIT Advisory group to join the training team as an instructor on the topic of autism spectrum disorders.
- ◆ In March 2018, COS Lauren Quinsland was selected for a workgroup at the Dept. of Public Safety Standards and Training to revamp and develop mental and behavioral health curriculum for all new public safety recruits in the State of Oregon. COS Quinsland was also selected for the Washington County CIT Advisory group in October 2018, in addition to serving on the training team.



COMMUNITY OUTREACH

The Forest Grove Police Department takes pride in our relationship with the citizens of Forest Grove and strives to create and participate in positive, meaningful opportunities to interact with the public, with businesses, and with civic, social, and non-profit organizations.



CITIZENS ACADEMY (JANUARY-APRIL) is a 10-week course taught by officers designed to introduce the community to the FGPD and law enforcement. 2018's class had 24 participants.



COFFEE WITH A COP: Throughout the year, the FGPD invites the public to local cafes for free coffee and an opportunity to ask questions, raise concerns, and get to know the officers who serve our community.



SHOP WITH A COP (DECEMBER) is a special event with Washington County Sheriff's Office that partners police with local underprivileged children to go Christmas shopping for their families. Nine FGPD officers and staff members participated in 2018's event.



SCHOOL TOURS: Throughout the year, the FGPD opens its doors to local schools for field trips, station tours, and a special Q & A with the Chief.





NATIONAL NIGHT OUT (AUGUST) Each summer the FGPD hosts a city-wide block party with games, safety exhibitors, vehicle displays, bicycle and backpack raffles, food trucks, live music, ice cream with a cop, and more. More than 1,600 people participated in the 2018 event - a new record!



COMMUNITY EVENTS: Our patrol officers make positive community engagement a priority and regularly meet with school groups, scouts and clubs, neighborhood gatherings, and more - not to mention the occasional waterfowl rescue. The FGPD also participates in numerous events throughout the year, including the Founders Day Corn Roast, the Love Rocks Run, Special Olympics Torch Run, the Pink Patch Project for cancer research, Holiday in the Grove, Downtown Trick or Treat, the Public Service Open House, First Wednesday and the Farmer's Market, among others.





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
